

7. ****Ward's Bridge-** Early name of Montgomery, James Ward built a bridge near this site, mid 1700's for access to his Grist Mill nearby, now gone.

8. **First Post Office and General Store** (Currently Iron Cafe)
9. **National Hotel-** Prominent since stagecoach days. (Currently Pazzo's, an Italian restaurant)
10. **Walden Savings Bank-** Site of National Bank of Montgomery in early 1900s.
11. # ****Village Hall-** Montgomery Academy 1791, fourth chartered secondary school, NY State, This building was built in 1818, focus of academy Hill/Union St. (Historic District - Entered National Register 1961)
12. # **First Presbyterian Church** (1831)
13. # **Orange County Firefighters Museum-** Original home of Montgomery Fire Department since 1913.
14. **Borland House-(457-1513)** Home of an early prominent family. Currently a Bed and Breakfast.
15. **Mead, Tooker House-(457-5770)** Home of an early prominent family. Currently a Bed and Breakfast.
16. **Montgomery Village Museum-** former Methodist Church (1829).

17. **Riverside Cemetery-** Protestant cemetery

18. **Veterans Memorial Park** including Senior Center and Sports Fields
19. ****Pleasure Ground Park-(1850-1878)** Orange County fairs, circuses, sports, field-days. 1870 horse driving park, harness racing, 1/2 mile track, scouting events until 1930

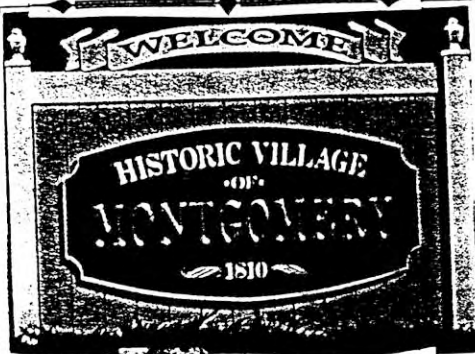
Mastodons were distant relatives of elephants which lived about 45,000,000 years ago. They stood about 6-10 feet tall and weighed 8,000 -12,000 pounds. Mastodons roamed the Earth and lived in forests on every continent except Antarctica and Australia.

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Welcome to our historic and picturesque community nestled along the Walkkill River in eastern Orange County, N.Y. Palatines from Germany(1700s)were among the first settlers to invade the open space belonging to huge mastodons and friendly Indians. In the 1800s, they were joined by the Dutch, Scottish-Irish, English, Irish, and later the Italians.

Montgomery was first called Wardsbridge, after James Ward, a grist mill operator, who built the first bridge across the Walkkill River to facilitate the transportation of farm and industrial products to market. The village's name was later changed to Montgomery, in honor of General Richard Montgomery, a Revolutionary War hero, who was killed in the Battle of Quebec(1775).The Village of Montgomery was incorporated in 1810.

Early settlers found fertile soil for farming and harnessed the rapidly flowing Walkkill River for milling. The Crabtree family opened the Montgomery Worsted Mill. Farming and milling were the main sources of employment until the mid-1900s. In December 1868, Chauncey Brooks, an early settler and engineer, built the first railroad station in Montgomery. Farm and industrial products were then able to be transported throughout the state. Mr. Brooks also designed and built many of the Victorian homes found throughout our village. Travelers found food and lodging at the Patchett House, Empire House, and the National Hotel.

Today the Village of Montgomery has a population of close to 4,000 and it continues to grow. Many residents find employment elsewhere, but daily anticipate their commute to a quiet adopted hometown each sunset. The Village of Montgomery prides itself on being a community built upon values.

1. *****Water Works-** (Built 1895) Installation of water system throughout village streets, homes, and businesses. Water pumped from springs and wells here.

2. ****Patchett House-** Early inn on Cohecton Tpke. Federal style, later alterations, home of Patchette family, 1891-1877. Cohecton Turnpike is NY Rte. 17K.
3. ****John Crabtree House-** This Queen Anne Victorian residence was built in 1899-1900 by Chauncey Brooks for John Crabtree, whose family ran the nearby mill. The house has remained in the Crabtree family for a century. (-RL Williams, Town Historian)
4. ****Montgomery Worsted Mill-** Original mill built by Johannes Miller in 1813. Rebuilt after fire in 1892. Owned by Crabtree family 1880-1939, on Walkkill River. (Entered National Register 1981)

5. **Empire House-** William Lodge and his family were the proprietors of this early hotel for generations. (Currently Wards Bridge Inn, a full service restaurant)
6. # **Montgomery Fire Department District 1810-** A newly built firehouse becoming a district; originated in 1810 with the village's incorporation.
